

How can I use this with my children?

In order to develop their writing, your child may begin to use expanded noun phrases, adverbials and complex sentence structures. This poster gives your children ideas of words to use when doing this.

How does this help my children's learning?

As your child's writing develops, they'll begin to use conjunctions, adverbs and prepositions more accurately in sentences. As their skills grow, they'll need to build up a range of vocabulary to use.

Ideas for further learning:

As your child begins to learn the words contained in this poster, see in how many different sentences they can use their new language. Can they create a sentence that uses one of each type of word?



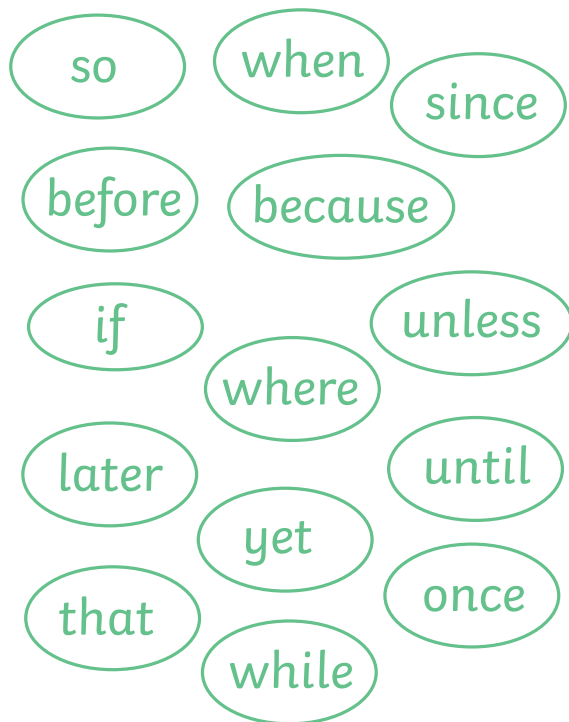
Using Conjunctions, Adverbs and Prepositions

-to Express Time, Place and Cause

Conjunctions link words and phrases together. Adverbs modify verbs, adjectives and clauses. Prepositions describe location, place and time.

Remember that some words can appear in more than one column because they can belong to more than one word class.

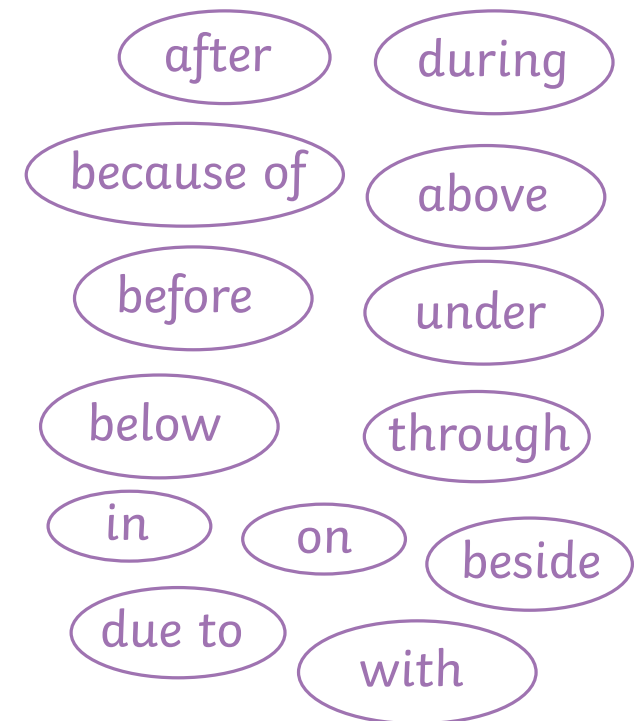
